On the 25th and 26th of February, the Slynn Foundation, in conjunction with Public Administration International (PAI) and the British High Commission Nicosia, presented a two-day training course which was held at the Court of Audit in the northern part of Cyprus.

The training course was delivered by the Foundation's chairman, Sir Stephen Irwin, and English barrister and deputy High Court judge, Ms Helen Malcolm KC.

This year's programme, presented over the two-day period, provided a broad opportunity for representation from the judiciary and members of the Bar of the northern part of Cyprus and covered areas of criminal and civil procedure.
